OUR MISSION

Alliance for a Better Community is a group of concerned citizens, organizations, and officials working together for the common goal of improving the quality of life for our North Pacific County families and youth

An announcement was made at the last WCN meeting on February 4, 2015 that Alliance for a Better Community is in the strategy stages of a huge endeavor. While attempting to re-purpose current buildings into an Activity or Community Center, the results have not turned out.

We are looking for written support from our fellow agencies and organizations in letter form that speaks of a need for our citizens to have a place to gather, learn, recreate, and promote social well being at little or no cost to the users.

Written support is the first stages of our strategy. Once there is evidence of strong community support any applications for grants to fund this type of facility will be stronger. There is a huge need for practice fields for soccer and other sports and trying to schedule practices between events takes parents chasing their kids all over the place and late into the night, sometimes, having to practice in another county.

Imagine a new facility that would be an Activity Center/Practice Field combination, on a hill, out of the flood zone. This facility could be designed to be very versatile and even include some conference rooms to double as a social hall. It could have an indoor pool, indoor basketball court that also could double as volleyball court, etc.

Out of the flood zone, funding could be applied for use as an emergency storm shelter as well. Many avenues of funding can be pursued by our ABC non-profit 501C3 status to reduce costs to our county and citizens. ABC has already obtained a movie about a small county that initiated the “If You Build It” program that funded students in the schools, mentored by contractors, to build a new Farmer’s Market. This taught them life skills and they received school credit as well. Pride in their creation kept at-risk kids in school and the sense of ownership to them reduced vandalizing of the property. The whole community benefited.

Lighthouse to Lighthouse Hike

Saturday, May 16th, join us for a hike from North Head Lighthouse to Cape Disappointment Lighthouse. Local ecologist, Kathleen Sayce, will be guiding on this surprisingly strenuous 4 mile hike, with more than 1000 ft of elevation gain. She will provide educational facts regarding coastal forests, trees, and other natural history of the headlands. Participants are encouraged to wear stout shoes or boots and bring walking sticks, clothing suitable for the weather of the day. A sack lunch, bottle of water, and snack will be provided. Pick up locations include: Aberdeen at 7 am, Raymond at 8 am, and Ilwaco at 9 am. Cost \$77.89



Discovery Trail Hike

Saturday, June 13th, our voyage sets foot at the Seaview Beach Approach south on the Discovery Trail learning about the different fauna and flora that surrounds us; at O'Donnell Rock we will leave the trail for the beach, to walk to Fishing Rocks, continuing the discussion on beaches and seasonal changes to the dunes. Kathleen Sayce, local ecologist, will be leading this 5 mile hike. Comfortable walking shoes are recommended as well as clothing suitable for the weather of the day.
