Our mission is to support an inclusive community network that encourages communication and collaboration among service providers, business, and volunteers, to enhance quality of life in north Pacific County.



New Immunization Requirements

The Washington State Department of Health has announced a change for the 2016/17 school year. It will now be a requirement for all students attending school to have at least two doses of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine. If a person gets chickenpox it causes a rash, itching, fever, and tiredness. It can further lead to severe skin infections, scars, pneumonia, brain damage, or death. By getting immunized it can prevent the person from developing shingles in later years. Shingles can be very painful. It is also a requirement that all students entering the sixth grade get a dose of tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (TDaP) vaccine. The TDaP vaccine is recommended every 10 years. You may need to get it sooner than 10 years if you get a bad wound that may become infected.



but not required vaccination for teens. This is the vaccine protects against nine types of the HPV virus, which causes 90 percent of cervical cancers and 90 percent of genital warts. Three doses of HPV vaccine are recommended for everyone between the ages 11-26.

Meningococcal (meningitis) vaccine protects against four types of a bacteria that cause meningitis (swelling of the covering of the brain and spinal cord). All II - I8 year olds should get this vaccine. Adults at high risk of getting the disease, such as college freshmen who live in dorms, should also get it.

If you or your student need to get one of these immunizations, call your medical provider or the health department for an appointment. Washington State is a free vaccine state. Vaccines are available to everyone under the age of 19 free of charge. The office may charge an office visit but not for the vaccine. If you have questions, please call the health department at 875-9343.

South Bend Timberland Library Receives \$4,500 in Grants

The South Bend Timberland Library is pleased to announce it has received a \$3,500 National Science Foundation Rural Gateways grant from the Califa Library Group to provide science-based programs for adults.

The programs funded by the grant are essentially "book club meets science café." Attendees read a popular book selection, then to come to the library for an event in which they discuss the book, and then watch and discuss short videos featuring author interviews and information about the scientific ideas touched on in the books. Among the titles to be discussed are:

- lean Auel, The Land of Painted Caves,
- T.C. Boyle, When the Killing's Done
- Clive Cussler, Arctic Drift
- Erik Larson, Thunderstruck

The South Bend Timberland Library is one of 110 libraries participating in the program nationwide.

The South Bend Timberland Library also recently received a grant of \$1000 from the Pacific County 4-H Leaders Council to start a robotics program at the library. The library has purchased 18 Ozobots, tiny line following robots that can be programmed both with a computer and by drawing color codes with markers. After debuting the new Ozobots at the Pacific County Fair in August, the library will begin presenting monthly robotics events for kids and teens starting this fall.
